AGENCY REPORT Summary Statistics From All Sites



ADOPTIVE PARENT RECRUITMENT

Adoptive parent recruitment began at one month post-placement. The adoptive family received a study brochure and a letter from their adoption agency explaining the details of the Early Growth and Development Study. If the adoptive family was not interested in learning more about the study, they were asked to return a self-addressed and stamped postcard to the study. If the study did not receive a postcard from the adoptive family after one month, the study attempted to recruit one of the birth parents. After one birth parent had been successfully recruited, a different recruiter from the study contacted the adoptive family. If the adoptive parent was interested in participating, they were sent information abut the study and a set of Informed Consent forms. Once the Informed Consent forms were signed by the adoptive parents, they began their participation in the study. Across the United States, 1,796 letters were mailed to potential adoptive families, of which 324 families returned a postcard indicating that they did not wish to receive any information from the study. In total, we attempted to recruit over 500 adoptive families and 359 adoptive families agreed to participate.

ADOPTIVE PARENT DATA COLLECTION

Adoptive families were asked to complete three in-person visits with the Early Growth and Development Study. On average, the visits occurred when the child was 9, 16 and 27 months old. Adoptive parents completed a booklet of mailed questions prior to each in-person visit. An interviewer from the Early Growth and Development Study met with the adoptive family in their home at a time that was most convenient for the family and the child. The 9 and 27 month old visits lasted 3 hours, while the 16 month visit lasted 90 minutes. During the visits, the adoptive family completed a variety of activities and tasks. Some of these activities included the child and the interviewer, while the adoptive parents completed computer-assisted questionnaires on their own. Other tasks involved the adoptive mother and child, the adoptive father and the child, or all three members of the family. The adoptive family was compensated \$100 for their time and efforts completing each booklet of questions and each in-person visit. The child also received a toy at each visit.

Adoptive parents also completed a brief phone interview when the child was 6, 12, 22, and 36 months old. The phone interviews provided our staff with the opportunity to stay in touch with the adoptive family before and in-between the in-person visits.

ADOPTIVE PARENT DATA

The data that is presented in the following report was primarily collected from adoptive parents during the first in-person interview. There are also some data that were collected during the 6 month phone interview. This data set includes responses from 352 adoptive mothers (presented in red font) and 344 adoptive fathers (represented in blue font). We have included the descriptive statistics for all questions related to the adoption process.
